Sternberg's Triangular Theory of Love

Robert Sternberg's Triangular Theory of Love states that there are three basic components that make up love which are passion, intimacy, and commitment. Different combinations of the three basic yield the different kinds of love relationships, which are outlined in the chart below.

Three Basic Love Components (P.I.C.)

Passion The aspect of love that involves emotional arousal and physical attraction. Passion is often more dominant at the beginning of a relationship.

Intimacy The aspect of love that involves a warm, close, bonding between individuals. Intimacy involves communicating about significant matters, emotional support, mutual respect, support during difficult situations, and sharing.

Commitment The aspect of love that involves a decision to remain with another person in a relationship. Sternberg describes two types of commitment: a short-term commitment made at the beginning of a relationship expressed interest in the relationship and a long-term commitment which is the decision to pursue a stronger relationship that continues into the future.
