2. A diagnosis of antisocial personality disorder requires that the individual is at least 18 years of age and evidence of conduct disorder must be present with an onset before the age of 15. Conduct disorder involves a pattern of behavior in which the basic rights of others or age-appropriate norms are violated. The specific behaviors characteristic of conduct disorder falls into one of four categories: aggression to people and animals, destruction of property, deceitfulness or theft, or serious rule violations.
